From the **PASTOR**— *Celebrate!*

We had the privilege of receiving a visit from our Bishop, Robert Hoshibata, on December 4th. Although it was short notice, we were able to gather about 15 persons from the church who hold various leadership positions. He was with us for about an hour and a half.

His purpose in visiting the various churches in the Conference is at least two-fold: for the churches and him to become acquainted with each other and for Bishop Bob to have a better understanding of our ideas about church vitalization.

We spoke of different things: mission work, drawing younger people and families, being a welcoming presence for those who come through our doors regardless of their background or experience. There were others as well.

When we began speaking of our many mission projects, both in town and elsewhere in the world, he was impressed with the amount that we do with so few people. He also shared with us his definition of missions: active vs passive. Bishop Bob described "active" missions as those in

which we are out among the persons receiving our care. All others he described as “passive” missions. He believes that these are the missions in which we do not become involved with the persons receiving the help.

I believe, however, that there are at least three types of missions and that each has its strength.

Many of the missions to which we give money are better served through contributions to large-scale efforts that have organization and distribution that we could not do individually. This is, indeed, passive on the part of the contributor.

The other activities under the Bishop’s definition of “passive” is what I would call “active” (sweat equity). We physically buy the goods, or pack the goods, or prepare the food. We then deliver the materials to the various agencies that will distribute them. Again, I see this as a more efficient use of resources – getting the goods to the persons who need them when we do not know who they are.

I would place the work we do with Family Promise under what the Bishop calls “active.” My word, however, would be “interactive.” We not only provide material things that they need for the week, but we also become closely involved and engaged with them during that time. We also have church members who provide transportation for persons who are clients of Duet.

I would say that the “interactive” gives a fuller experience to the volunteer as well as to the person receiving. It’s called relationship.

We also spent much time talking about building and maintaining relationships: making those persons feel welcome who could easily be overlooked if we are not intentional and vocal about radical hospitality. Bishop Bob is a Christian because his school friends in Hawaii invited him (a son of Buddhists) to a Methodist country church – and he was made to feel loved and nurtured. We are to accept ALL persons as they are and let them see Christ in and through us.

REFLECTION OF THE HOLIDAYS

During the holidays, we take comfort in the familiarity of family, music, and God's unending love. There are family gatherings, either on Christmas Eve or Christmas Day, to share in gift exchanges, eating meals or snacking on Christmas cookies. We sit and watch our mothers and grandmothers prepare dishes passed from generation to generation, getting just the right touch of each ingredient, for the tastiest treats. We listen to stories from loved ones, laughing about the sled that got away or when we got caught stealing a pastry from grandma's window sill.

When I was a child growing up, our families were too large to buy gifts for every child so we drew names from a hat. Each adult member would draw the name of another adult. I always hoped my Aunt Susie would draw our family name because she was so creative with her gifts and we knew her gifts came from her heart. We were the traditional Mexican family, ate tamales on Christmas Eve and roasted a turkey on Christmas Day, along with our traditional side dishes of green chili, beans, and rice, with fresh tortillas made on the wood



stove out back. During the day, the children would be busy with new toys and running in and out of grandma and grandpa's house, while the adults sat around catching up on the latest births. It was always a happy time with laughter and singing. At night, we would hear great uncles and aunts singing and playing the guitar to familiar Christmas carols, all in Spanish of course. It was always fun to hear Uncle Lorenzo singing, "Silver Bells" after a long afternoon of one too many holiday spirits. He sang it with a



loud Spanish accent and always held onto that last note with *a grito* (enthusiasm) in his voice. The sounds and smells of a familiar Christmas will live in my memory forever.

Today, we are teaching our children what a traditional Christmas smells, sounds, and feels like. You see, this is our first Christmas together. Unlike many families, our children were not born with the knowledge of the great news of Jesus's birth. Our children did not learn from their birth parents about God's abundant love for us or how we should love our neighbors (others) as God loves us. Our children are still learning about the basics of kindness and trust. According to child development theorists, we must learn to trust our environment in order to achieve the next level of becoming successful human beings. We have to feel secure, as a child, that the people raising us will protect and nurture us, feed us, and keep us from harm. And we also have to trust that these same people will not allow others to perpetrate on us.



This is where we are with our children. By teaching the true meaning of the holiday season, we are going one step further and showing our children that God's unending love is safe and very protective. We are starting new memories of trust and familiarity. Our children will know that the Holy Spirit will always be with them, to protect and guide their memories of



Christmas pasts, and if it's God will, to trust their new family's traditions, including the true meaning of Christmas, the birth of our Savior, Jesus Christ.

RAMBLINGS FROM THE EDITOR

As far as the church is concerned the New Year began with the first Sunday of Advent (four Sundays before December 25th), and Christmas just began on December 25th and will last for 12 days until Epiphany on January 6th. Not quite the schedule we see on TV and radio and in stores.

This discrepancy really does not upset me because I believe we use the liturgical calendar primarily to ensure we remember and celebrate each year the major events and teachings of scripture. A MESSAGE OF THANKS


Your congregation's partnership with Duet truly changes lives. The following transcript is a phone message left by Martha B., an 89-year-old Duet "neighbor" (our term for client).

CHRISTMAS FOOD BOX **PROGRAM 2013**

During this Christmas season through your efforts we were able to collect 58 food boxes during the month of December. A special thanks to everyone who donated money toward a food box or who donated a food box. Thank you!



Enough money was collected through donations that Faith UMC purchased food for 42 food boxes. On December 14, 2013 about 27 individuals gathered together in the Koinonia Room and put all the food purchased in boxes. Also during the month, several members of the congregation took food boxes home and had friends and neighbors help fill the boxes and 16 were returned to the Church.

The fifty-eight (58) food boxes were distributed to individuals and to organizations. Forty (40) food boxes were given to Wesley Community Center Christmas Program for families in need. They add a food box for the families who have the greatest need. The Phoenix Indian Medical Center received eleven boxes. They also have a program where they distribute the food boxes to those needing it. Seven boxes were given to families with some connection to Faith UMC.

Just in case we forgot someone, the Administrative Council wants to thank those individuals who made the food box



program a success by helping to tape the boxes together, sort the boxes, pack the boxes, stack boxes, deliver the boxes, and anyone who helped. We appreciate your support of the Christmas food box mission project.

A "2nd Mile" Giving Opportunity

Both main clauses of Faith UMC's Mission Statement (see below) hint at this need. Early on in our congregation's history, I'm told, there was an expense budget line item for this cause. In more recent years with our budgetary deficits, this line item disappeared. However, in late 2012, your Administrative Council authorized its resurrection as a "discretionary" giving opportunity for those of us who may be able to make an occasional contribution toward "...the care of [Faith UMC's] constituents" or those other "...persons who... require sustaining assistance."

So, let us all keep this "2nd mile" giving opportunity in mind — especially during Advent and Lent, or whenever we're blessed with an unforeseen financial windfall. This can help our pastor relieve those emergencies with which s/he is often confronted — unbeknownst to most of us; and sometimes feels compelled to aid with her/his own funds if none other is available.

Simply designate any such contribution as "PDF." It will be segregated from other operating budget funds and will show up on your annual giving summary as a designated gift apart from your regular pledge payments.

I do not understand how I am misinterpreting "teach justice, love kindness and walk humbly with your God (Micah 6:8) or "where there is no vision, the people perish" (Proverbs 19:28).

I do not understand how I am misinterpreting "let justice roll down like waters and righteousness like an ever flowing stream" (Amos 5:24).

I do not understand how I am misinterpreting, "You that are accursed, depart from me into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels; for I was hungry and you gave me no food, I was thirsty and you gave me nothing to drink, I was a stranger and you did not welcome me, naked and you did not give me clothing, sick and in prison and you did not visit me." (Matthew 25:41-43)

I do not understand how I am misinterpreting "whoever claims to love God yet hates a brother or sister is a liar. For whoever does not love their brother and sister, whom they have seen, cannot love God, whom they have not seen. And he has given us this command: Anyone who loves God must also love their brother and sister." (1 John 4:20-21)

Nor will I try to do so.

On September 16th these dreamers gathered together to speak about their dream, their dream to have a community garden on the campus of FUMC. That night the dream became a vision and in the following weeks became a mission in the form of words. In the beginning it seemed to some, an impossible dream. Obstacles seemed insurmountable with lack of resources and funding staring everyone in the face. Now, only four months later, what was an empty, abandoned playground has been transformed; all the materials needed to build eight 4 x 8 beds are ready and waiting: lumber, screws, and soil. What a wonderful way to begin the New Year, building not only the infrastructure for a new garden but building and growing new friendships. Sowing, not just the seeds of vegetables, fruits and flowers but of hope, peace, joy and love.

As you extend the mantle of compassion beyond the building that is called "the sanctuary" to include land that surrounds it, as neighbors and passersby begin to see new life and activity, it will spark interest and curiosity. New friends will be made and the dream of a garden community will grow.

Everyone is welcome to join in the fun regardless of the color of your thumb. The next eight weeks will be very busy but we have only scheduled three official workdays.
