From the **PASTOR**—

Thinking theologically:



"Many people were coming and going, so there was no time to eat. He said to the apostles, "Come by yourselves to a secluded place and rest for a while. (Mark 6:31)"

I don't know about you, but sometimes I just get so tired. Some would say it's because I work too hard...others would say it's because I'm not sleeping well enough, and both of them would be right. I tend to be a bit of a workaholic, especially when there's a lot of work to be done. And when it's hot outside, I don't sleep very well, even when the air conditioning is on. What's more, for the last 30 years, ever since my children were born, even the slightest noise wakes me up at night...and once I'm awake, my brain starts working, thinking about all the things that need to get done, and then there's no hope of me going back to sleep! It's times like that when I wish someone would just knock me over the head with something and render me unconscious so I could get the rest I need!

Jesus understood the value of rest. In chapter 6 of Mark's gospel, we read that Jesus traveled around to various villages, teaching the

people about the kingdom of God. He even sends the disciples out, two by two, giving them authority to teach and do miracles, and when they all come back together, he knew that they needed a break. So he says to them, "Come, rest awhile." Take a break. Take a load off. It's time to go someplace secluded, alone. So you can rest, recharge, and be ready for what happens next.

As your pastor, I love each and every one of you. I hope you know that, because it's true. But I also need time alone, time to rest, recharge, and be ready for what happens next. PASTOR JODY TO PARTICIPATE IN WESLEY PILGRIMAGE

For 10 days during the month of July, your pastor will be participating in the Wesley Pilgrimage in and around London, England. I was one of several church leaders, both lay and clergy, who received scholarships from the UMC Discipleship Ministries (formerly the General Board of Discipleship) that cover the majority of the trip. The Pilgrimage itself is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to walk in the footsteps of our founder, John Wesley, experience some of the places where he and his brother, Charles were in ministry, and hear some marvelous speakers share vital information about the beginning of the Methodist movement.

The Pilgrimage will begin in Salisbury, home to a vital Methodist congregation that was once served by Francis Asbury. Asbury was appointed by John Wesley as one of the first two bishops of the Methodist Episcopal Church in the United States. After Salisbury, we will explore Epworth (the Wesley's birthplace), Oxford (where John & Charles led the Holy Club), Bristol (home of the Methodist societies and class meeting), and London (where John built the center of British Methodism).

Since this is a continuing education event there is quite a bit of required reading, which I've been working through in my spare time. While I'm there, I'll be attending lectures and other teaching sessions, as well as meeting with a small group of other pilgrims. As a lifelong Methodist, I'm excited about learning more about this denomination that I've come to love, and look forward to sharing what I've learned with all of you when I return.

A pilgrimage is a journey to a sacred place as an act of religious devotion. Each day will begin and end with scriptural devotions, prayer, and receiving of the sacrament of Holy Communion. The goal of this pilgrimage is to help us grow as faithful leaders for the United Methodist Church and its mission to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. This is a rare opportunity that I'm so grateful to be a part of. I will be leaving on July 11 and will return July 23. I would greatly appreciate your thoughts and prayers while I'm traveling during this time of learning, study, and prayer.

STRENGTH FOR THE JOURNEY **- A GREAT EXPERIENCE**

I am excited to share with you the great experience that our campers and staff had at the annual Strength For The Journey (SFTJ) retreat for people living with HIV/AIDS held between May 14th and 17th at Mingus Mountain. Earlier this year, we were hoping to have between 6 and 10 campers as we were in the process of creating the next chapter of this retreat with some changes in staff and programming. In the end, we had 38 campers and 12 staff including one of the largest groups of women campers in recent years thanks in part to one of our staff members who brought several women from Powersource Tucson, an empowerment program for women living with HIV/AIDS.



During the retreat, there were several great workshops that were held including journaling and yoga, nutrition, and photography. We also had crafts and tie-dye activities, along with our annual affirmation bag project which is our opportunity as a SFTJ community to affirm each other with cards of encouragement which truly give our staff and campers strength along the journey, giving them a piece of the love that is experienced in the short four-day retreat as they return home.

I also had the opportunity to spend some quality time with several campers ministering to them, hearing their stories on what brings them to the camp and identifying ways that our SFTJ community can support them in their life's journey. I learned through their stories their courage and success along with some painful memories that they are still working to get past. I learned that many of our campers have some significant histories and that HIV/AIDS is not their only challenge. They suffer from substance addictions, unemployment, underemployment, and homelessness. Some of our campers are undocumented and as a result have challenges getting and taking the medications necessary to fight their HIV infection.

Another great outcome of the retreat was not only ensuring that we will have return campers next year, but as a result of their experiences, some of our campers have chosen to return to church after several years of feeling ostracized from their faith because of their diagnosis.

All in all, I and the staff believe that this year's SFTJ retreat was a success on many levels. From my own perspective, this part of my journey has affirmed for me my own calling. These campers have taught me what it means to be invited into a space where strangers are not easily trusted and to have the opportunity to truly be the hands and feet of Christ to others so that they can experience the goodness of God's grace.

Dear Members and Friends of the Desert Southwest Conference...

(An open letter on Bishop Bob's Blog)

Grace and peace to you in the name and spirit of Jesus Christ!

Many organizations are experiencing the challenges of the changing social environment in which we live. Shifting dynamics of demographics and economics create distinctly different challenges for us in the United Methodist Church and the Desert Southwest Conference as well.

These societal changes are evident as we look at the patterns of worship attendance, church mission participation (in committees, UMW, UMM, youth groups, Bible studies, and other small groups), congregation finances, maintenance of buildings and other property, and many other areas of church life. Clearly, we are seeing that we cannot continue doing things the way we have been. Change is in the air.

In order to help us navigate through some of the dynamic changes that are taking place in our Desert Southwest Conference, I have invited a small group of persons to meet with me to discuss prayerfully some of the ways in which our Conference might best meet the challenges of the present. This small group is the Missional Stewardship Task Group. My hope is that this group will reflect prayerfully on the challenges that our congregations face and will consider ways that we might change that is focused on fulfilling our mission.

Members of the Task Group are: Anthony Tang, Barbara Davis Hines, Dave McPherson, Jerry McGuire, Jonathan Arnpriester, Kathie Barnes, Mary Bullis, Randy Bowman and Sharon Ragland. They offer a wide range of expertise and gifts, but they all possess a love for Jesus Christ, a strong commitment to the church, and a willingness to dedicate time and energy to the task to which I have invited them.

These persons have been invited "to engage in honest reflection in order to steer our annual conference toward increased growth and vitality while maintaining a sharpened focus on

our ministry as we align our resources with our mission and our strategic direction." Let me share some of what I am expecting:

To engage in honest reflection. Our honesty is a gift to each other, to the church, and to God. This Task Group has been asked to prayerfully reflect and to come to the table with open minds, but with a willingness to be honest about our thoughts and feelings about very critical matters related to our Conference and its future.

To steer our annual conference toward increased growth and vitality. We will be learning what our current reality is as a Conference. What does it mean to live in a geographic area where the economy is slowly rebounding, and where the communities we live in are changing dramatically while the populations in our pews are aging? Does our Conference support and encourage growth? Or are we willing to simply wait for decline to take us over until the last person "turns off the lights" in our beautiful sanctuaries?

To maintain a sharpened focus on our ministry. In our conversations, we want to discuss the way we order ourselves as a Conference. Do the structures that are in place best utilize our laity and clergy for mission and ministry? Or are we simply putting names on a slate of officers and committee members without real attention to the passion and the interests and the talents of the individuals or the purpose of the committees and task groups?

To align our resources with our mission and strategic direction. We want to ask ourselves how to best insure that decisions about resources are directly connected to the mission of The United Methodist Church and the Strategic Direction of our Conference. How, for example, might we best utilize our financial resources to promote the making of disciples of



Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world? And how would we best use our resources to empower leaders who create vital congregation? We need to create a culture where decisions related to the use of resources are foundationally about MISSION and about GOD, more than about institutional preservation.

We will be discussing a wide range of topics, and we are guided by a book written by Bishop Robert Schnase, entitled "Remember the Future." The Task Group is not called to make any decisions for the Conference, but rather, to serve as a guiding, advisory group for me. Out of the synergy of our conversations may come some recommendations that may be shared with the Conference for possible implementation through channels of decision making that are already in place.


